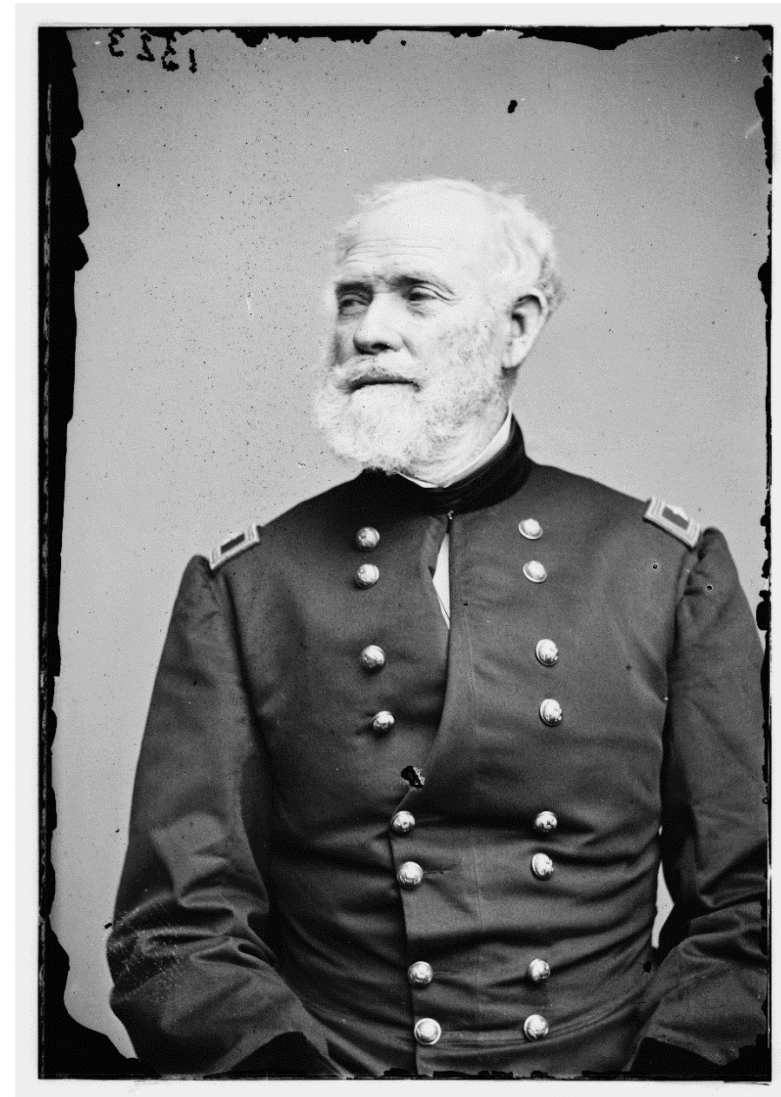




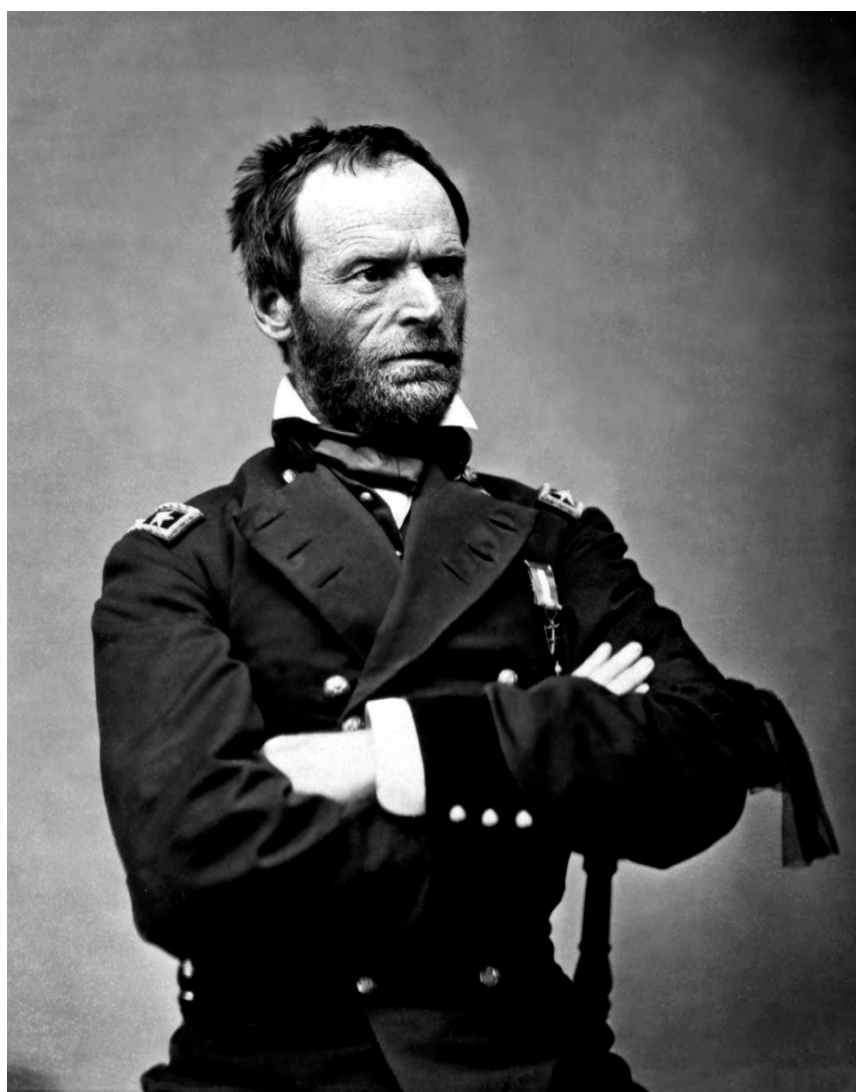
General Alfred Howe Terry (1827 - 1890)

General Alfred Howe Terry was born November 10, 1827 and lived until December 16, 1890. In his lifetime he attended law school and was a Union General in the American Civil War, and a military commander of the Dakota Territory from 1866 to 1869, and again from 1872 to 1886. A member of the Indian Peace Commission, he helped negotiate the 1868 Peace Treaty of Fort Laramie and was one of its signers.



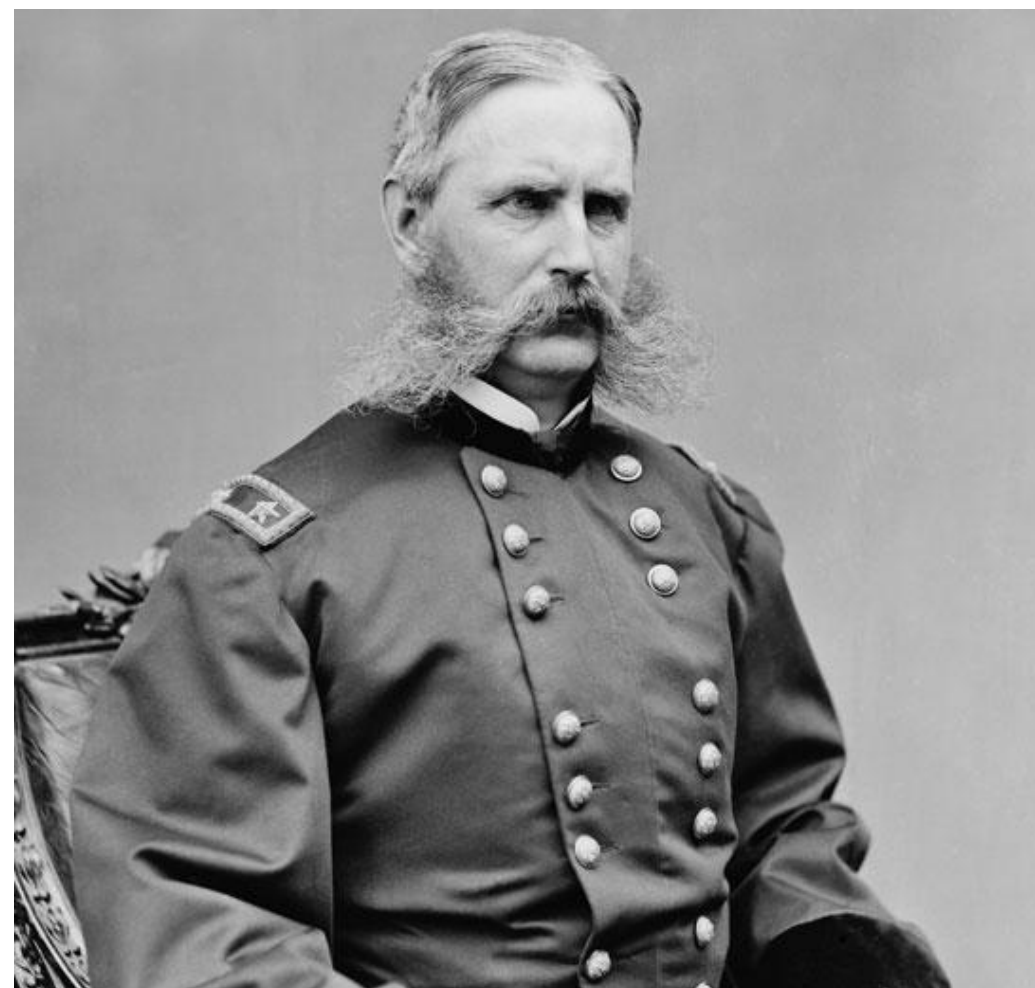
General William Selby Harney (1800 - 1889),

General William Selby Harney was in command of numerous military expeditions on the northern plains and gained a reputation as an Indian fighter employing hit-and-run tactics of guerilla warfare. Harney returned to the northern plains as a member of the Indian Peace Commission in 1868, after the Fort Laramie treaty negotiation, he was temporarily placed in command of the Sioux territory.



General William Tecumseh Sherman (1820 - 1891),

General William Tecumseh Sherman was a U.S. Civil War Union Army leader perhaps best known for “Sherman’s March” on the Confederate South, ruthlessly destroying everything in a 60-mile-wide path from Atlanta to the eastern coast. General Sherman was a member of the Indian Peace Commission and a signer of the 1868 Fort Laramie Peace Treaty.

Augur graduated from West Point in 1843 and took an active part in the Indian campaigns in the Western frontier. Following the Civil War, Augur went on to command several military departments including the Department of the Platte from 1867 to 1871. He played a major role in negotiating the Treaty of Medicine Lodge in 1867 as well as the Treaty of Fort Laramie in 1868.
